As in the past, we were challenged again this year, yet we are filled with opportunities and promise. We continue to pursue our overall mission of preserving and promoting our quality of life, creating safer neighborhoods, and allowing all tribal members a chance to prosper. The following pictures and articles contained in this report reflect some of the hard work and success that White Earth Nation experienced in 2014.

White Earth continues to increase the human services we offer to our tribal members and their families as we finalize the transfer of services from the counties to the tribe. We strive to work toward successful collaborative efforts with counties and the State in order to enhance human services throughout the White Earth Nation. We also began to introduce an easier and more efficient process to improve delivery of health and human services to our membership through the WECARE system.

This past year White Earth Nation continued to strengthen our sovereignty through several initiatives. We worked to protect our wild rice lakes and rivers at the State level by defending against invasive, genetically engineered rice. We have been in partnership with several other groups in protesting the Enbridge pipeline. Construction of the pipeline would endanger our right to clean water, affect wildlife and cut into the heart of the Mississippi Headwaters. We have continued to work on implementing the new Constitution. We have to remember, Constitutional Reform will take patience, training and

ongoing support. If we are to remain on the course of building up our nation and people, we must stay true to our path. Finally, we strive to demonstrate our sovereignty with steady support for our 1855 Treaty Authority.

We are living in very challenging and dynamic times. We share in the struggle to improve our lives, retain our identities, and keep our children safe; as your government, we strive to work with you to make this a reality. We are blessed to have so many hard working individuals and families who continue to create places where our children can grow into their future roles within our tribe. I would like to thank all of the White Earth families for your continued support.

Vision: The White Earth Tribal Council will be a proactive organization that makes sound decisions promoting mino-bimahdiziwin (The Good Life). The White Earth Nation will be a safe place where all people have access to quality employment, housing, education, health and human services. While we protect our inherent right to self-governance and identity, we are a community of respect where cultural, historical and environmental assests are treasured and conserved for future generations.



History

The sun shined on the lush, green lawn of the Crow Wing County Jail at the southwest corner of Front Street and Fourth Street in Brainerd. This setting was not even remotely close to what happened at that site more than 142 years ago. On July 23, 1872 two American Indian brothers, and members of the White Earth Nation, tragically lost their lives in Crow Wing County. The men were accused in the disappearance of a 22-year-old woman from Crow Wing Village. They never stood trial and were hung at the site where the county jail now sits for allegedly murdering the woman.

As part of Brainerd History Week, the White Earth Nation Indian Honor Guard presented its flags during a pipe ceremony on June 18, 2014 at the site where the tragic hanging occurred hundreds of years ago. Terry Tibbetts began the reconciliation event by smudging and praying for the two men during the ceremony. He noted that justice was not served and offered a tribal blessing. Brainerd Mayor James Wallin took part in the pipe ceremony, and stated, "It is quite an honor to be here. Of my 72 years on this earth, this is the most momentous occasion I've ever been a part of." Mayor Wallin said the tragic event should have never happened in 1872, but is blessed that the city and the tribal nations can work together to host the reconciliation event. Mayor Wallin read the proclamation before organizers unveiled a replica of a reconciliation plaque that will be placed at the site.

Chairwoman Erma Vizenor said, "We stand here today as relatives, as brothers and sisters, as human beings, whom we all were created ... and we come together. We cannot undo history of what had happened, but we can change what is happening today." Chairwoman Vizenor then shared some history with the crowd to clarify why those men and other Native Americans were in the fur and logging community of Crow Wing Village near Fort Ripley. She said many White Earth Indians came to the Gull Lake and Mille Lacs lake areas during that time when tensions were high with the European settlers. She said all they wanted to do was sell blueberries, and that was how the so-called Blueberry War got its name. Chairwoman Vizenor declared we are all on a journey together, and every derogatory word is hurtful to all people. Brainerd Council Member Mary Koep said the June 18, 2014 reconciliation was the one event of all the Brainerd History Week activities that is most dear to her heart, and the one that she really wanted to make possible. "We wanted to have this so bad," Koep said. "We had a few setbacks, but I'm so happy that it is here. It's a good thing to see people come together. If no one remembers this week, I hope they will remember this reconciliation. We can't change history, but how can we bring us all together as one family, one nation? This is a day that will go down in history. We all came together with love and friendship."







Giwanikimin (we live in harmony) supportive housing

We live in harmoney is the translation of Giwanikimin. The Giwanikimin homeless housing complex was built in Naytahwaush. It is located just north of the Community Service Center. The hope is to lower statistics of homelessness by 1 in 3.



There are 20 units in this complex that provide 2, 3 and 4 bedroom units built in a townhome configuration. Many different services are available to tenants. Some of the services include: case management, mental health, chemical dependency, child protective services, health services, employment services, dv/sa services, disability services, therapeutic child care and services that are individualized for the consumer.

The college also brought back alumni to campus for festivities honoring them as former graduate students. Commencement ceremonies for 15 graduates was celebrated on May 17th. These 15 graduates received their AA degrees and more than 35 students received their Adult Basic Education/GED's.

Gaawiin Giiyaabi

In the year of 2014 the Gaawiin Giiyaabi (No More) has been doing community meetings within White Earth Communities. The topics have been cultural and spiritual in nature to address the Substance Abuse issues that affect all of us as Anishinnaabe people of Turtle Island. The goal is to incorporate more of Minobimaadiziwiin in to our daily lives. We as Anishinnaabe need to remember our roots that our elders

have sacrificed for us in the 7th Fire from the 7 Prophecy. We are moving forward with upcoming community events along with beading, drumming, language tables and lacrosse.

Court

The BIA recently evaluated and found that our court was not only fair in handling large volumes of cases but was well respected for providing fair process by both local attorneys and the community members that participated. Our court statistics for 2014 are 1,104 new cases filed with 3,250 hearings.

DWI Court

White Earth and Mahnomen County currently have an operational DWI Court that is available for offenders who are cited for an alcohol related DWI. Currently have 5 participants in the program. A Tribal Court Judge and a 9th District Court Judge preside over the Court together. White Earth is in the planning phase of developing a DWI Court with Becker County.

Juvenile Wellness/Dually Involved Youth Program

During FY14 there were 45 juvenile clients, average age of 15, participating in the JHTWC/ DIYP. Out of the 45 clients, 33% of the juveniles required in-patient treatment prior to participating in the specialty court process. In comparing statistics from 2013 to 2014, the need to refer participants to inpatient treatment was reduced by 19%. Of the drug testing performed on the clients, 84% of the tests were negative. The statistic show the programs are successful in providing the much needed services to our youth.


New Dialysis Center Opens

White Earth Nation Kindergarten Readiness Guide A Kindergarten Readiness Guide has been developed by the White Earth Pre-K to Grade Three Leadership team. Local reservation schools, child cares, head starts and other educational programs are represented. The purpose of this guide is to support a child's first teachers; parents, families, Head Start, Child Care, ECFE, with key Kindergarten readiness concepts. It reflects local, state

The child must accomplish various listening, speaking, reading, writing, social/emotional, mathmatical, science, art and physical and motor development skills for their age capabilities.

and national standards. This Guide respects and values the cultural tradition and ways of our families and students.

Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG)

On November 19, 2014, President Obama signed the CCDBG Act of 2014 into law. This reauthorizes the child care program for the first time since 1996 and represents a historic re-envisioning of the Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) program. The new law makes significant advancements by defining health and safety requirements for child

care providers, outlining family-friendly eligibility policies, and ensuring parents and the general public have transparent information about the child care choices available to them. The law also changed the language for tribal set-aside from up to 2% to no less than 2%. White Earth Nation worked with Minnesota's Senator Al Franken and Representative John Kline's offices on inclusion of tribal language in the new bill.

White Earth Child Care Director Barb Fabre was one of six Minnesotans that received the 2014 Virginia McKnight Binger Award in Human Service. She also helped her staff celebrate the 50th anniversary of Head Start.





Human Service Transfer

Strengthening our sovereignty by demonstrating our capabilities:

The Minnesota Health Care Programs transfer to the White Earth Nation strengthens our sovereignty by demonstrating our rights to serve our people.

The White Earth Band of Ojibwe Human Services Project has accepted the legal responsibility for providing human services to tribal members early in 2013. Passed by the Minnesota legislature in 2011, this transfer occurred first with tribal members living in Mahnomen County. The Human Service Financial Service Department -Niiwijiigonann (We Assist Each Other) is now doing eligibility determination for Minnesota Health Care Programs as we have accepted the legal responsibility for these programs: MA, SNAP, MFIP, GA, MSA, DWP and GRH for White Earth families.

Over the past two years, Niiwijiigonann has been able to provide services to more than 2,000 members living in Becker, Clearwater and Mahnomen Counties whose services have been transferred to the White Earth Nation.

In 2015, Niiwijiigonann will continue to expand services to members and their families within the defined service area. This means any family who has a White Earth member and non-member in their families will be eligible for services through the tribe. Today we provide services to over 1,800 cases through the White Earth Nation! Our offices are located in Naytahwaush, Detroit Lakes, Mahnomen and Bagley.

The Traditions, Language and Culture (TLC) Committee:

The Traditions Language Culture (TLC) Committee has been implementing Lacrosse, Language Tables, and a Culture Camp at Circle of Life Academy (COLA). The TLC has been using White Earth Elders for implementation of all Cultural events. The TLC is in support of keeping our Traditions Language Culture and way of life alive. We are always going to follow Minobimaadiziwiin

Promise Zone

White Earth seeks Promise Zone designation in collaboration with Leech Lake and Red Lake Tribes.

In his 2013 State of the Union address, President Obama announced that he would designate 20 Promise Zones nationwide: urban, rural, and tribal communities where the Administration would partner with local leaders to create jobs, increase economic activity, improve educational opportunities, and reduce violent crime. The first urban, rural, and tribal Promise Zones were announced on January 9, 2014, in a ceremony at the White House. Locations are in: San Antonio, Los Angeles, Philadelphia, Southeastern Kentucky, and the Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma.

The federal government will partner with selected communities to help the Promise Zones access the resources and expertise they need. There are currently twelve federal agencies working in close collaboration to provide resources and expertise to urban, rural, and tribal Promise Zones to expand economic mobility and opportunity in their communities. The four main agencies are pictured below.









Foreign Trade Zone

White Earth in conjunction with the Carlson School of Business researches feasibility of White Earth Nation and foreign trade zone status. An effort to expand economic development opportunities.

White Earth Wild Rice

White Earth Nation begins plans to move the wild rice packaging, sales and distribution to a new location and start the process of creating a new LLC; White Earth Market. White Earth Market will continue to be the main selling force behind wild rice sales. Along with wild rice, additional products including maple syrup, honey and native crafts, have provided diversification and growth.



Business/Art Accelerator:

The White Earth Nation art accelerator was given the name Gizhiigin, which means grow fast. This venture was made possible through funding by White Earth Nation, USDA, First Nations Development, and the City of Mahnomen.

Gizhiigin offers a unique opportunity for artists to establish the skills neccessary to excel and allows them to continue to pursue their passion for the arts.



Community Sustainable Agricultural Project

An initiative to improve food systems in our communities and to address some of the well-documented and interrelated negative conditions impacting our communities through a project that unifies food, health, youth, and community toward more positive outcomes based upon food system change. The Project engages youth in local food system change through positive youth involvement within their local food systems and their communities. It is an effort to build the local

food system as a community unit tied to a

tribal network.

The project offers community youth a structured opportunity to learn about food systems through hands-on learning about agriculture such as high tunnel technology, and wild orchard development. Learning and hands on growing, and food systems development is complemented with Elder leadership within their own communities.






Mino Wiisini Grand Opening

Shooting Star Casino Installs New Signage

Shooting Star Casino, Hotel and Entertainment unveiled a brand-new, state-of-the-art pylon exterior sign, complete with a four-beam promotional searchlight system that can be seen from 10-15 miles away from the north, south, east and west elevations, showcasing the casino to all of Highway 59. The sign also consists of halo- and face-lit channel letters, two electronic message centers, exposed electric blue LED accent lighting, faux brick stonework to complement the casino's exterior architecture, glass bead epoxy texturing, and a precision-carved and painted tribal logo and plaque.

Construction began in early March 2014 on new the signage designed and created by Indigo Signworks which headquarters is based in Fargo, ND. The sign was designed to be assembled in eight separate pieces.

We have also increased advertising outside of our reservation communities through Google Adwords, Direct email campaigns and for the first time in a national magazine.





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Tribal General Fund



As a segment of total expenditures, the general fund makes up a significant portion of overall expenses. This fund consists of income from gaming revenue, grants, cigarette tax and sales tax, some of which are restricted to specific designated purposes. 2014 general fund outlays totaled **\$14.4 million** and were allocated by the Tribal Council as outlined above.
