



Greetings once again from the great White Earth Nation! This past year we have taken great strides as a Nation towards our overriding mission: to preserve, promote and enhance our quality of life. While there are many successes shared in the following pages, I would like to highlight some of the most significant changes that strengthen our sovereignty, self governance and overall self determination.

In 2013 White Earth has transferred nearly half of human service cases for tribal members and their families from delivery by Mahnomen, Becker and Clearwater County. These services are now being provided by the tribe in a professional, respectful and culturally appropriate manner. By the end of this year the transfer should be nearly complete. We are the first tribal nation in the United States to strengthen our sovereignty by assuming the honor and responsibility of serving our own tribal citizens.

This past year the tribal council voted to move forward with allowing the tribal membership to decide on the next step of many years of work on constitution reform, and on November 19, 2013 the people of White Earth spoke loud and clear. With a record voter turnout the referendum was approved by an overwhelming 80% of voters. We have taken the next step; however the work has only begun. The



document approved is not a self executing constitution and will take careful planning and extensive research and training to implement, all the while taking the necessary precautions to preserve what we have already achieved as a nation.

We take pride in many happenings from the past year and we look ahead with optimism to the coming year featuring such things as the opening of a state of the art dialysis center and the continued reintroduction of the creators game, lacrosse, to our youth.

We are excited about the progress we have made and look forward to continued opportunities to build our future.



Vision: The White Earth Tribal Council will be a proactive organization that makes sound decisions promoting mino-bimahdiziwin (The Good Life). The White Earth Nation will be a safe place where all people have access to quality employment, housing, education, health and human services. While we protect our inherent right to self-governance and identity, we are a community of respect where cultural, historical and environmental assests are treasured and conserved for future generations.



The largest Indian population in Minnesota calls itself Anishinaabe, which in our language means "the original people." White Earth Nation is located in the north central United States near our Canadian First Nations brothers and sisters and in proximity to Gitchi Gumi (Lake Superior). Within our boundaries are all of Mahnomen and parts of Becker and Clearwater counties of north-central Minnesota. Although this Nation was reserved under the 1867 Treaty between the Mississippi Band of Chippewa Indians and the United States, our rich heritage far precedes this event. We are one of seven Chippewa/Ojibwe nations in Minnesota and while we no longer live as our ancestors of the past we have kept alive our culture and heritage in almost every aspect of present day life.

As is true for all Anishinaabeg living in Minnesota, the story of the White Earth people begins in ancient times in the

eastern part of the United States. There, our ancestors lived before coming to the forest and lake country of eastern and northern Minnesota. As our legends and stories tell us, the people of White Earth, along with many other Anishinaabeg, migrated west from the eastern shore of Turtle Island (North America) stopping and settling in many places thousands of years ago. The people were instructed by a prophet to travel west until they found the food that grows on the water; manoomin (wild rice).

Unfortunately, like so many other Native Nations, slowly over time our land, resources and culture were taken beginning in 1837 and continuing through subsequent treaties, federal acts and on through the "Termination" Period of the 1950s. To understand the history of White Earth, it is necessary to understand much of the story of American Indian people has been left out of history books, or begins only after Europeans arrived here.

The people of White Earth are resilient and although we were left with a nation of fractioned land, poverty and economic challenges, we continue to value our heritage, language and culture. We are a progressive nation determined to exercise our sovereignty, play a key role in this country and state and secure a successful future for the next seven generations.

The 638 transition of IHS Mental Health services under White Earth Tribal Mental Health is the result of the Tribal Council's call for mental health services that are united and free of obstruction and duplication.

This transition is encapsulated within the Tribal Council's vision of tribally operated programs leading and guiding services that are culturally appropriate and address the unique needs of the White Earth Nation. During this transition period and beyond, both programs will be working as one to ensure that ease of accessibility, continuity of care, and most importantly, quality of care remain the top priority.

The merger will also allow for future development of service capacity with the potential of extending services hours into the evenings for both the community based and clinically-based programs.

White Earth has the opportunity to utilize third party billing for services such as substance abuse, mental health, home health, and transportation to name a few. With the opportunity to bill for services, this allows programs to expand and meet the needs of White Earth.

Gaawiin Giiyaabi

In an effort to unite the people to address the Substance Abuse issue on the White Earth Nation, The White Earth Tribal Council approved a position for a Community Liaison Officer. White Earth Police Officer Merlin Deegan accepted this position. This program was prayed about and named "Gaawiin Giiyaabi" which translates to "No More."

Officer Deegan is working with many White Earth programs. He has traveled to the communities and villages to listen and learn from the people. Officer Deegan has been in each community at least 5 times and making at least 30 community visits since the beginning of October 2013. The knowledge learned is being passed on to the different

programs to develop and refine them for the people of the White Earth Nation.

Grand opening celebration held for newly constructed Naytahwaush Head Start building

The new environmentally friendly, green tech Head Start facility was constructed in the village of Naytahwaush. It has 2 classrooms that serve 37 students, a home base office, large multipurpose room, and a huge playground.

Head Start is extremely proud of the implementation of preschool Ojibwe language curriculum for our early learners and the annual Head Start Pow Wow. With the need to move toward the restoration of the Ojibwe language it is exciting to see the preschoolers learning, speaking, and identifying many Ojibwe words at an early age. It is also exciting to see the teachers enthusiastically teaching Ojibwe and having fun while participating in language training sessions with GIM consultants.

Head Start was a recipient of a \$99,000 grant to purchase 2 new Head Start buses critical to maintaining safe transportation services for Head Start students and \$35,000 to update communication equipment in all buses.

Other Head Start locations are:

Pine Point, Rice Lake, White Earth, Waubun, and Mahnomen.

Smart Play Spot Opens



White Earth's Smart Play Spot, an interactive children's exhibit, was funded largely by the State of Minnesota, Clean Water, Land and Legacy Amendment, Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund, with additional funding from the Grotto Foundation, Midwest Minnesota Community Development, West Central Initiative Foundation and the S.F. Perkins Fund of the Minneapolis Foundation.

This \$44,500 exhibit gives children access to hands-on learning experiences in a Smart Play Spot, sets the stage for success in school and in life. Minnesota Children's Museum is transforming community locations across the state by designing and installing Smart Play Spots into libraries and community centers. The White Earth Smart Play Spot is the fifteenth of 18 planned literacy environments.







On Nov. 19, the people of the White Earth Nation voted by a margin of nearly 80 percent to approve the proposed constitution. A total of 3,492 votes were cast with 2,780 voting to approve the new constitution and 712 voting to reject. This is more than double the number of votes cast in an average election at White Earth.

The document approved is not a self executing constitution and will take careful planning and extensive research and training to implement, all the while taking the necessary precautions to preserve what we have already achieved as a nation.

This process was fully funded by the Bush Foundation.

Human Service Transfer

Strengthening our sovereignty by demonstrating our capabilities:


The White Earth Band of Ojibwe Human Services Project has begun to accept legal responsibility for providing human services to tribal members early in 2013. Passed by the Minnesota legislature in 2011, this transfer will occur first with tribal members living in Mahnomen County and will start with the White Earth Nation doing eligibility determination for Minnesota Health Care Programs. The assumption of legal responsibility for other human service programs will follow.

White Earth Human Services has recently created the White Earth Nation Financial Services Department – Niiwijiigonann (We Assist Each Other). This department provides eligibility determination for MA, SNAP, MFIP, GA. MSA. DWP and GRH for White Earth families.

Over the past year, Niiwijiigonann has been able to provide services to more than 1,400 members living in Becker, Clearwater and Mahnomen Counties who have been transferred to the White Earth Nation.

In 2014, Niiwijiigonann will continue to expand services to members and their families within the defined service area. This means any family who has a White Earth member or descendant is eligible for services through the tribe.

Today we have transferred over 1400 cases from the Counties to the White Earth Nation! Our offices are located in Naytahwaush, Detroit Lakes and Bagley. We hope to open offices in Mahnomen and White Earth in the near future.





The Traditions, Language and Culture (TLC) Committee:

Focusses on revitalizing the language and increasing efforts in preserving and promoting our traditions and culture.

We supported 39 community cultural classes between White Earth and Pine Point and over 120 Ojibwe Language Tables between White Earth, Mahnomen and Naytahwaush communities.

TLC has also supported several traditional camps: Berry, Wild Rice, Sugar Bush, Winter camp

TLC was honored to support Ceremonial Drum by providing room accommodations at Shooting Star Casino for their traveling drums guests.



White Earth Enterprises, LLC

Formed in 2012 to manage and operate White Earth Building Supply, LLC and White Earth Business Products, LLC. The Company's financial accounting was outsourced to Shooting Star Casino in July 2012. This restructuring allows for further development of the Company's business processes and growth. The Company's total revenues were \$2,956,292 while expenses totaled \$2,908,802. White Earth Builders, White Earth Sanitation, and White Earth Renewable Energy Solutions also came in as component units under White Earth Enterprises and were rebranded.





Business/Art Accelerator:

Likened to a business incubator model, the "Accelerator" is a collaboration with the White Earth Tribal and Community College, City of Mahnomen, University of Minnesota Extension and White Earth Nation. This project is poised to provide entrepreneur services and guidance to upstart businesses and individuals. Included within this program will be a youth entrepreneurship component supported by University of Minnesota Extension Services.

Transfer Station

White Earth Sanitation has just finished an Integrated Solid Waste Management Plan which will expand the services we offer to Residential and Commercial consumers, including new initiative of recycling. We are working with White Earth Environmental Agency and Becker County on collaborative efforts of reducing waste, reusing waste products and recycling plans.

New transfer station to be constructed Summer 2014.

White Earth Enterprises in conjunction with White Earth Economic Development are exploring Agricultural and Food Business developments for FY2014-FY2015. WEDO and WEE are collaborating by using Tax Advantages and 8(a) Certifications or Hubzone initiatives to entice economic development and jobs creation within the White Earth Reservation.

Through this collaboration, with White Earth Economic Development, we will be evaluating prospecting business investment in new and or existing companies, through partnerships, joint ventures, and or other tribal ventures.



Total Tribal Expenditures




White Earth Nation expenditures increased from \$57 million in 2012 to just over \$58 million in 2013. As our program and service offerings continue to expand, we will continue to increase our economic and social diversification with the region.

In 2013 White Earth Nation provided over \$34.7 million in payroll and benefits. This number grows to over \$64.6 million annually when coupled with our associates at Shooting Star Casino!

Tribal General Fund



As a segment of total expenditures, the general fund makes up a significant portion of overall expenses. This fund consists of income from gaming revenue, grants, cigarette tax and sales tax, some of which are restricted to specific designated purposes. 2013 general fund outlays totaled **\$12.4 million** and were allocated by the Tribal Council as outlined above.
